

Jesus Feeds the Five Thousand



How many of you have heard of the time that Jesus fed 5,000 people with just a couple of loves of bread and some fish that a little boy had in his basket? We call that happening a miracle. No one else could have done this, except for Jesus, and he did it several times. We can't explain it and we don't even try to. All we know is that a lot of people were with him one day at supper time and no one had anything to eat. The disciples wanted to send the people away, but Jesus told them that they should invite the people to stay and be fed. It seemed impossible to feed that many, but they knew that Jesus could do some amazing things, so they invited the people to sit down and wait for something to happen.

Jesus sent the disciples out to find whatever little bit of food they could and bring it back to him. They found one little boy whose mother had packed him a lunch of bread and fish. The next time you sit down to your table and you see bread in a basket, perhaps you will think about the day that Jesus showed the power of God with a great picnic lunch.

REMINDER:

GUIDE LINES FOR CHURCH SERVICES

PLEASE FOLLOW THESE GUIDELINES WHEN ATTENDING CHURCH

- Do not come to church if you have had a fever within 24 hours
- Face coverings or masks <u>must</u> be worn
- You will enter church through the front door and exit through the red door beside the bathrooms.
- Bring your Prayer Book from home. There are no books in the pews. If you do not have a Prayer Book we will provide one for you. Take it home and bring it with you next time you attend. The readings for each Sunday may be found on line at <u>lectionary.com</u>. You may also download the service onto your tablet or cell phone and bring that to church
- Keep social distancing at all times. Walk where the blue crosses are on the floor
- Sit in the pews marked with a blue crosses 6 feet apart. Families are alowed to sit together.
- Place your offering in the plate at the door to the parish hall as you leave.
- No socializing in the parish hall, no coffee, no sitting. Exit through the door beside the bathrooms.
- One person allowed in the bathroom at a time. Wait in the hallway and please social distance.

Report from the Junior Warden

A Strong Foundation

During the Covid pandemic church maintenance has continued. However, there is still plenty to do.

A leak was discovered in the Day School building which was caused by pine straw and dirt in the gutters. The gutters have since been cleaned.

There are pine trees around church building that need to be cut back to prevent damage to the roof.

The church grounds are being taken care of by a professional company. Borders are weeded, edges trimmed, bushes trimmed when needed, and the yard is mowed weekly.

Dot Pierce and her helpers take care of the flower borders. Thank you Dot! There is always pine straw and pine cones that need to be picked up.

We have some damage to the ceiling in the parish hall due to a leak in the small steeple. The leak will need to be taken care of as soon as possible.

Now that church is opening on Sundays, the sanctuary needs to be sanitized. Kevin Bates, our janitor, sanitizes usually at the end of the week. Help is needed to wipe down the pews after he sanitizes. This has to be done each time.

The maintenance and upkeep of our beautiful church and church grounds requires quite a bit of time and effort. We need your help! If you are willing to help with any of the projects listed below, please call Linsey, (757) 581-1123.

- Yard work, picking up pine cones and pine straw
- Leak in steeple, repair work
- Pine tree trimming
- Sanitizing the pews, wiping all wood surfaces.

Letter from the Senior Warden

Right now, our church has lost our Priest after 23 years. The church has moved into a time of transition, and we the members feel like we've had the wind knocked out of us.

He has loved us, fed us, and protected us. He has doctored our wounds and rejoiced when we rejoiced. But now this man is moving on, and sadness and discouragement well up.

I simply want to hearten you with six biblical truths.

1. God will be with this church at all times.

We are not forsaken. God is with our congregation. "I will never leave you or forsake you," (Heb 13:5). Priests will come and go. Only God will never leave us. And the presence of God is more vital to the life of the church.

2. God is in control.

God "works all things according to the counsel of His will" (Eph. 1:11). Do you believe that? This pastoral transition is not happening outside of the will of God. God is working this according to the counsel of his will. So, the question is not, "Who is in control?" God is in control. The question is, "Will you rest in him by trusting him?"

3. God plans good out of this transition.

It might not feel good right now, but God has promised that he works all things together for the good of his people (Rom 8:28). Is our church part of his people? If so, this transition is included in "all things"? Therefore, you can rest assured that good will come from it. That's how awesome God is: even those things that don't feel good are used for good. It might not be the good you have in mind, but it is good. Therefore, walk forward in faith.

4. It's okay to weep.

While good will come out this pastoral transition, that doesn't remove the deep sadness. Losing our Priest hurts. I'm reminded of how the Ephesian elders wept at Paul's goodbye: "And when he had said these things, he knelt down and prayed with them all. And there was much weeping on the part of all; they embraced Paul and kissed him, being sorrowful most of all because of the word he had spoken, that they would not see his face again. And they accompanied him to the ship" (Acts 20:36-38).

I believe the Ephesians knew that God would be with them, that he was in control, and that he was going to bring good out of this transition. Nevertheless, they wept. And it's okay to weep. It's actually a way of saying thank you to both God and our Priest.

5. Ministry must go on.

Notice what the Great Commission does not say, "Go therefore and make disciples . . . if you have a Priest." We must continue with our Ministries; the Great Commission does not include any conditionals.

Does ministry become a bit harder without a pastor leading? Probably so, but if he was a good pastor, he will have obeyed Ephesians 4:11-12 by equipping the saints for the work of the ministry. In the interim, you and the lay leadership of this church must make sure ministry continues. Get to work!

6. The church must not scatter.

Jesus promised the flock would scatter at his crucifixion (Mat 26:31). For a season, that's exactly what happened. The same often happens in churches during pastoral transition. Because "their" Priest is no longer there or ministry begins to lag, folks trickle out. Some reasons for going might be legitimate, but this may also be the time in which the congregation should most strongly Gather Together for support and encouragement.

Recognize the temptation to scatter and work more diligently to stay bound together in unity and love. This will be a season of testing for us all. I know we didn't ask for it, but with God's help, we'll endure it.

Especially during this pandemic, we must work even harder to overcome the trials and tribulations of being separated from our Christian Community and strive to be present to one another with faithfulness and prayer to God and His Church.

May the interim bring blessings we never expected, and I pray that God provides a new Priest for our church soon.
