WE ARE HIRING!

St. Peter's Day School is currently in search of few good people to fill some empty slots at the Day School for this coming school year. These positions do not require a degree, just a love of children and learning.

- Teacher—Pre-K4: The children are learning to print upper and lower case letters, the number 0– 25, shapes, colors, sequencing, opposites, coloring, gluing and cutting skills. It is from 8:45 - 12:15, Monday - Friday. All federal and religious holidays observed.
 - 2. Extended Care Aide The children in extended care (ages 3—6) attend 7-9 am and 12-6 pm Monday thru Friday (before and after school care). The aide may be asked to work all or only part of those hours. We always have at least two aides and this number will increase as needed. We will work with you on scheduling to best fit everyone's needs.
- Teacher Aide—2 year old class This position would be from 3—6 pm, Monday—Friday and maybe as substitute teacher if a teacher is absent. In this class, the children are just learning social skills, and potty training.

Luke 12:32-40 Where Is the Treasure?



Helen Keller is a woman who was born in 1880. When she was one and one half years old she had an illness that caused her to be blind and deaf. She could not see and she could not hear. We can hardly imagine how difficult life would be for such a person. She was unable to communicate with anyone. She could not hear words that were spoken to her therefore she had no way to learn how to speak words. Because of this she became an unruly child and others thought she was unable to learn.

When Helen Keller was six years old her parents hired a teacher, Anne Sullivan who came to live with the family and work with Helen. Usually a person who is blind is taught to use Braille, a system of small raised dots that represent letters and numbers. When the dots are touched they can be translated into words which allow a sight impaired person to read.

People who are unable to hear learn sign language. Hands and fingers are positioned in various ways to represent specific letters, words or phrases. Facial expressions and body language are also used to help hearing impaired people communicate.

In Helen's case, since she could neither see nor hear, it seemed there was no way to teach her sign language or Braille. Anne Sullivan, Helen's teacher, was very persistent and caring. She worked with Helen every day for many hours. One day there was a breakthrough. Helen and Anne were outside near a water pump. Anne Sullivan, ran water over Helen's hand and at the same time moved Helen's hand in sign language, demonstrating the word for water. At that moment Helen learned there were names for things. There was now a way she could learn to communicate with others.

Helen Keller was a remarkable woman who went on to graduate from college (Ratcliffe) with honors, wrote

many books, traveled all over the world and met world leaders. In spite of her disabilities she accomplished many things and was an inspiration to others. One of the most profound things she said was, "The best and most beautiful things in the world cannot be seen or even touched. They must be felt within the heart."

In the Bible Jesus talked about this very thing when he said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (12:34). The things that are really important are not the things we have, but the love we feel in our heart. It is love that comes from God and it is ours to give to others. *Where is the treasure? It is in your heart.*

Jim's Corner

s an update to where the Vestry of St. Peter's and I are on my status as your permanent Supply Priest, we are still waiting on the Canon to the Ordinary (Bishop Susan's Canon), the Rev. Canon Roy Hoffman, to finalize the decision to change my status to Interim Rector. I am deeply humbled and honored by the prospect of being your Interim Rector, and by the trust the vestry will be placing in me to fulfill this role. This is a significant decision as it signals the vestry's intention to start the hard work of the discernment process of calling our next rector. I expect this discernment process to take from between eighteen to twenty-four months, though, possibly and hopefully, it will be a shorter timeframe. In that time, there is much to be done.

In order to give a prospective candidate for the position the clearest understanding about St. Peter's, I believe a parish profile will need to be drafted. This profile will include a history of St. Peter's; a good demographic profile of the parish; clear parish mission and vision statements; a financial statement including an annual budget; a presentation of the various ministries offered in the parish; some key photos and a possible diagram of the plant layout; a statement of what the parish expectations of the candidate are; an itemization of annual parish events and discussion of parish family life; a presentation of Norfolk and Hampton Roads and what the area has to attract the candidate including area amenities, attractions, hospitals, educational opportunities for a family and other information. Don't let this overwhelm you. It is a lot of work, but the reward for the work is a clear self-understanding of the parish and an honest presentation to anyone looking at the position.

To obtain this information, the Search Committee will employ various methods. Your help will be essential in answering a probable questionnaire and returning it to the committee. Some committees use parish meetings as a means of gathering information. Your willingness to participate in these gatherings will be vital to the success of the effort. Some of you will be asked to help publicize the data gathering instruments, analyzing the data, and compiling it into a useful document. My prayer is that if you are asked to help in this effort, you will readily and enthusiastically respond to the call (pardon the pun on the name of the newsletter). Each one of you is an important member of St. Peter's and I am confident that you want to see the parish thrive under new leadership. That does not happen all by itself.

Another element of your support is required. In order for St. Peter's to thrive, your attendance at regular, sustained Sunday worship and parish activities is a sign of the health of the parish. The Average Sunday Attendance is a piece of data that is included in the parish profile, and the Annual Parochial Report. One could argue that the ASA and the amount of financial support of the congregation reflects the spiritual vitality of a church. What brings us to church? Why do we give our hard-earned money to the support of St. Peter's? What motivates us to go, give, and share? James K. A. Smith tells us in his book *Desiring the Kingdom: Worship, Worldview, and Cultural Formation,* that "we worship what we love," p. 26. Who or what is the focus of our worship? The answers to these questions are, fundamentally, spiritual in nature. They reveal who we are as disciples of Jesus and how we live out our faith. How we spend our time and money reflect our priorities. Financial guru, Dave Ramsey, tells us if we look at our checkbook register, we will see what is important to us.

We are entering a time of self-reflection and honest evaluation. I believe this can be an exciting, lifegiving opportunity to discern our future and clarify our vision. I invite you to join me, and the vestry, in this new adventure. Let's look forward, not with apprehension, but with anticipation in where the Holy Spirit is leading us.
