What is Palm Sunday?

Palm Sunday marks the day Jesus arrived in Jerusalem on a donkey, just a few days before he was betrayed by his friend Judas Iscariot, one of the 12 apostles, put on trial and sentenced to death by crucifixion. The day is called 'Palm Sunday' because the people of Jerusalem threw palm leaves to the floor as a greeting when he arrived. Nowadays Palm Sunday is commemorated by a ritual procession of people carrying palm branches, or if these are not available, branches from yew, willow and olive trees into church. These palms are then blessed, and sometimes fashioned into crosses. Palm Sunday is always the Sunday before Easter and is also the final day of lent.

Why palms and a donkey?

Back in 5BC-AD33, palm leaves and branches were a sign of homage and thrown before people of great respect. The people also threw down their cloaks and clothes. Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a humble donkey as a symbol of peace – whereas if he had strode in on a horse, often used in battle, he could have been seen as an aggressor.



What happens to the palms after Palm Sunday?

Because the palms are blessed they cannot simply be thrown out as rubbish or discarded. Instead, the palms are burned after being used during the Palm Sunday ceremony and the ashes are used to mark parishioner's foreheads on the next Ash Wednesday (start of lent).

Most of all, Lord, we pray that you would help us to remember that you are the Sovereign Lord of the universe and that you rule over heaven and earth and are in charge of all things, and that you have promised to walk with us each minute of each day. Help us to trust you and to find peace in that promise. **Amen.**

Priest's Letter Holy Week

Though it might feel like Lent just started, Holy Week is just around the corner. The Episcopal Church has had a long-standing tradition of celebrating Holy Week by keeping the Triduum (pronounced TRID-oo-um). This tradition stretches back to at least the time of St. Augustine of Hippo who lived from 354 to 430 AD. The Triduum consists of three liturgies on the last three days of Holy Week. They are Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday. "But that's four days!!" you say. Right you are, dear reader. However, Christians adopted the Jewish tradition of the new day starting at sundown. So Maundy Thursday (a Thursday evening service) would be considered to place on Friday; Good Friday takes place on Saturday night. Sound confusing? IT IS.

Not to worry. Our plan for Holy Week will not be so complicated or confusing. We are going to have Lenten Liturgy on Wednesday night at 7PM in Holy Week. This will look a lot like Tenebrae with a few changes. Thursday, we will have a Maundy Thursday Liturgy at 7PM. Friday, we will have a Good Friday Liturgy with Stations of the Cross at noon. Easter Sunday will be celebrated at 9:00 AM.

A quick note about each of these services. Tenebrae is a combination of monastic prayer services for the Triduum. Monks have prayer services eight times a day (they have to wake up for two of them in the middle of the night!!). This schedule is quite exhausting during Holy Week, so they would do a whole lot of services together on Wednesday night and be free to get ready for the Triduum. A full Tenebrae service lasts over two hours (!) so I thought doing something shorter and with hymns would be more appropriate this year. It should look familiar to what you have done in the past. Maundy Thursday is a Eucharist that traditionally has a foot washing aspect where everyone washes everyone else's feet. This would be against COVID-19 protocol, so we won't be doing that. Also, in the Maundy Thursday Liturgy, the stripping of the Altar takes place at the end. The Good Friday Liturgy will feature readings, a sermon, and prayers. All of these liturgies (except Tenebrae) are in the Book of Common Prayer on pages 274-282. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to ask.
