

Jim's Corner

Stewardship is a word that has acquired an unfortunate reputation. When mentioned. many folks think the church is about to start a building campaign and instinctively grab their wallets. They know the church is looking for money. It's difficult not to feel this way. Some of us have negative memories of past stewardship campaigns that have felt heavy-handed or as in it, the world and all high-pressure holdups. I want to allay any such misgivings by laying out what happens when we give and why we give. I thank Dave Ramsey for what I am about to offer you.

Dave addresses what he calls The Great Misunderstanding, the mistaken belief that the way to have more money is to hold on tightly to it, as with a tight fist. To understand stewardship, one needs to understand its spiritual element. You see, you and I are simply managers for

the Lord. All of our material possessions are gifts from our Lord and we are given the responsibility to manage, to take care of, what God has given us. We are managers of what belongs to God, not owners. It is all God's, who is the source of everything, as Psalm 24:1 says. "The earth is the LORD's and all that is who dwell therein" (BCP, 613). Once we accept this basic principal, then the tight fist on money begins to moves us to become open up.

we give? Did you know that the Bible talks about money more often than it talks about love and grace? Why does the Bible tell us to give so often? It's because giving makes us more Christlike. We know from Genesis 1:26 that we have been made in God's image. I argue that this means we are

to grow to reflect God's qualities, however dimly, of love, compassion, mercy, discernment, and generosity, to name but a few. God is a giver who has given us life and all that we have. Through our relationship with God in Christ, who gave his life so we may truly live, we have been made to be givers as well.

Wonderful things begin to happen when we give. Giving less selfish and lessselfish people have What happens when more of a tendency to prosper in relationships and wealth. Because we are designed in God's image, we are happiest and most fulfilled when we are serving and giving.

Because, giving is a reminder of ownership. God owns everything, as I said above, we are only managers of God's property which includes money. We know from 2 Corinthians 9:7 that "God loves a cheerful giver" and giving brings us joy. When we give our offering on Sunday morning, this is an act of praise and worship. This is why I place the offering on the altar, as a symbol of our joyful offering to the Lord during the Eucharist, the Great Thanksgiving. Finally, giving is spiritual warfare. It gives us a sense of the cosmic warfare between good and evil, between generosity and selfishness. There is that internal struggle we experience when we decide how much we give back to God. Do we put God first in our budget, or do we put all of our other priorities first? From what I've just said, it is easy to see how giving is a deeply spiritual practice.

Stewardship is a grace-filled word. It expresses our relationship to each other, to creation, and to the Holy Trinity. How we manage our resources is an expression of our faith in the God who is Lord of all and giver of all. I ask that we pray for guidance as we approach the coming stewardship program.





"Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much." Luke 16:10 (NIV)

One day Susie's mother sent her to the store to buy a loaf of bread. She gave Susie two dollars and told her she could keep the change. When Susie paid for the bread, the cashier accidentally gave her too much money back. Susie knew right away that it was too much money. What should she do? Should she tell the cashier that she had made a mistake, or should she just keep quiet? What would you do?

James was going through the cafeteria line at school and looked down to see a dollar bill on the floor. There was no way of knowing who had lost the money, and no one would ever know if he just picked it up and put it in his pocket. What should he do? What would you do?

Hector found a money bag like this one containing \$120 on top of a coke machine at his school. Wow! That is a lot of money. Just think of all of the things you could do with \$120! What should Hector do? What would you do?

Every day we are faced with decisions which test our honesty. It may be a small amount of incorrect change, a dollar found on the floor, or a large amount of money such as Hector found at school. The amount of money is not important, it is a question of doing what is right.

One day Jesus told a parable about a rich man who accused his manager of wasting his money. He called him in and told to give an account of the way he had been managing his money. Sure enough, he had been taking some of the money for himself and cheating his employer.

Since the manager knew he was going to be fired, he came up with a plan that would make a lot of friends. He called the people who owed his boss money and asked them how much they owed. When they told them how much they owed, he told them they only had to pay a much smaller amount. As you can imagine, the people were very pleased to only have to pay a fraction of what they owed. The manager now had plenty of friends to help him when he no longer had a job.

Jesus told this story to show that "Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much." If you and I make sure that we are honest in the small things, then we can be sure that we will be honest in the big things. If people know that they can trust us in small things, they will know that they can trust us in the big things too.

Prayer: Dear Father, help us to remember what Jesus taught about honesty and help us to be honest in every situation, big or small. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

Vestry Meeting Minutes

July 11, 2022

Opening: The St. Peter's Vestry met together in the Diffenbaugh Library on July 11, 2022. Attending the meeting were Fr. Jim, Kimberly Truxell, Susan Sigler, Debbie Whitehorne, Charlotte Corbett, and Bruce Comfort. Charlie Pfeifer, Treasurer, and Peggy Pfeifer, Registrar attended via zoom.

Vestry Meeting Opening: Charlotte gave the meditation and opened the meeting with a prayer.

<u>May 2022 Minutes:</u> The Minutes of the last Vestry Meeting which was held in May were distributed to the vestry. Kimberly moved that the minutes be approved. Susan seconded the motion. The minutes were approved.

<u>Finance Report:</u> There being no formal Vestry Meeting in June, copies of both the May and the June Financial Report were handed out to the vestry. Kimberly reviewed the May report and Charlie reviewed the June report

Debbie moved that the May Financial Report be accepted. Kimberly seconded the motion. Kimberly moved that the June Financial Report be accepted. Susan seconded the motion. Both motions were approved.

<u>Vacation Bible School Funding:</u> It was proposed that \$200 to \$500 for VBS be funded by Youth restricted account. Debbie moved that it be so funded. Kimberly seconded the motion. The Vestry agreed.

Senior Warden's Report:

<u>Meeting with Elise Balcom</u>: Kimberly and Debbie will meet with Elise Balcom tomorrow concerning the church's coming transitional period.

<u>Sunday Services</u>: Kimberly informed the vestry that it had been proposed that St. Peter's return to two services on Sundays, one at 8AM and one at 10AM, starting on September 9, and lasting to the end of the year at which time it could better be determined if the congregation wished to continue that revised schedule. This suggestion passed the Vestry by acclamation. It was noted that this change should be widely communicated to inform all current and past church members in hopes of drawing them back to the church.

Junior Warden:

Lawn & Landscaping: Debbie informed the vestry that the mowing of the church grounds was being done quite well. However, the landscaping such as the trimming was not satisfactory. She has contacted the company concerning the problem.

<u>Floor Waxing:</u> During the waxing of the floors, wax was deposited on the carpets at the entrance doors and on the base-boards. Debbie has spoken with the contractor, and they are working on a solution to the problem.

Old Business

<u>Vel's Retirement:</u> Plans are well underway for Vel's Retirement Party on Sunday, July 24th. Invitations are going out to current and past staff and all congregation members as well as friends of St. Peter's.

New Business:

The Rev. Dr. James Hunter Housing Allowance: Whereas The Rev. Dr. James Hunter is employed as the interim minister of St. Peter's Church, Norfolk, Virginia which does not provide a residence for him, the vestry resolves that the total compensation to be paid to the Rev. James Hunter during 2022 be designated as housing allowance with the meaning of that term as used in Section 107 of the IRS Code of 1986. This housing allowance will stay in place until superseded.

There being no further business, Kimberly moved to adjourn. Bruce seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned and closed with the Lord's Prayer.
