From the Sr. Warden

When I was reminded, I had to provide my article for May's Call I was unsure of what I wanted to communicate, but then I checked my email and found Bishop Susan's Easter message in Tidings. The Tidings is the weekly newsletter from our diocese. I was not sure how many of you subscribe to the newsletter and really liked the message Bishop Susan wrote so I am sharing it with you, my church family.

Bishop Susan Haynes:

"A little over five years ago, just prior to Lent, we shuttered our church buildings and entered a time of pandemic exile where we tried to do church — physically scattered and spiritually fraught, frightened and lonely. We missed our sacred spaces, we missed our holy liturgies and most of all, we missed the physical presence of each other - our communities. It took a long time for us to come together again; and when we did, things were not what we expected. We wanted and looked for the same church we had left. Instead. most of us found fewer numbers of people, strained budgets, and divided opinions about how to proceed.

Today, most of us can agree on one thing, that the church we came back to after Covid is not the same church that we left. What is our reaction to that? For many of us, the reaction is to be afraid. When faced with uncertainty,

we naturally revert to fear. Why is that? Neuroscientists tell us that fear is an instinctive thing that gets activated without our even willing it. We've all experienced being confronted with a threat only to feel instinctive-


ly that we should fight, flee, freeze or sometimes appease. These kinds of instinctive survival reactions can override higher levels of thinking and completely take over our responses. We do things without thinking. When we experience fear, it is hard to hope. Hope is not a feeling that gets instinctively activated.

Easter is a time to remind us of our hope. We live in a culture of fear these days...fear and anger that grips us and activates that part of our brain that is reactive and instinctive. **However, we are an Easter people.** Throughout Scripture, angels and prophets exhort us not to be afraid...to choose life over death...hope over fear. Easter is a reminder that Death has lost, and Life has won.

When Mary approached the tomb on Easter morning and discovered the stone rolled away and the body gone, thinking that the grave had been robbed, her instinctive reaction was to be afraid. Even when she talked to the "gardener," she was so distraught and afraid that she couldn't see him for who he was. She was only able to be restored to hope when Jesus called her by name: "Mary!" The Jesus who knew her intimately spoke her name and activated that part of her brain that could connect with hope.

We celebrate Easter because we need to hear Jesus speak our name and be reminded that death does not have the last word. We are called to life. Many of us are afraid that our churches are dying. But Hope compels us to understand that the Church is not dying. It is quite possible that the churches we thought we had are dying. Perhaps they ARE going away, never to return. But the Church that God is giving to His Easter people today is not dying. The Church, the Body of Christ, is speaking Life as the last word, not Death.

Listen for Jesus to speak your name. Embrace hope as he tells you to get to church where He is headed to meet you. As you are going, speak the names of those you encounter and invite them along. Everyone is longing to be known and for their name to be spoken. Everyone is longing to be enfolded intimately into the circle of Christ – the Church. This is the Church and the Hope that Christ gives us. Alleluia!"


Gentle Reminder: Restroom Cleanliness


Seven Days in Utopia July 2 Film length: 1 hour; 40 minutes

A reluctant leader heads up a team of seven Christians intent on smuggling Bibles to underground churches in a future America where the Bible is illegal and danger is around every corner.


Christmas in July #1 I Heard the Bells July 23 Film length: 1 hour; 50 minutes



His Only Son August 20 Film length: 1 hour; 44 minutes



Vestry Meeting Minutes

March 9, 2025

Opening: The St. Peter's Vestry met together in the Diffenbaugh Library following the 10:00 A.M. service on March 9, 2025. Attending the meeting were: Kimberly Truxell, Judy Eller, Bruce Comfort, Charlie Pfeifer, Vel Shreve, Charlotte Corbett, Nancy Comfort, Liz Kress and Peggy Pfeifer. Linsey Shreve was absent. This meeting began with a meditation by Nancy Comfort at 11:30 A.M.

<u>Minutes</u>: The minutes from February 9, 2025, were read and a motion from Judy Eller was made accept the minutes and was seconded by Bruce Comfort. It was passed by acclamation.

Financial Report: Charlie presented February's Financial Report. There was an annual contribution from the Harold and Margery Taylor Fund today that is not included in this report. Charlie also somehow made a double payment to Insurance and Worker's Compensation in the amount of \$7845.00. The double insurance payment will be applied to the next quarter and the Worker's Compensation was refunded and that will be shown in next month's Financial Report. The Pancake Supper donations netted \$352.00. Vel Shreve motioned to accept the financial report and budget, and Liz Kress seconded. All approved.

<u>Senior Warden's Report</u>: Kimberly Truxell announced that Fr. J.K. Maher III will be here to celebrate with us on March 23^{rd} and 30^{th} . She has asked if he could commission the Vestry on the 30^{th} so if everyone could be in church that day it would be appreciated. He is also contracted to be here on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. Future dates will be announced as they are confirmed. The Vestry will be tasked with the Wednesday night Lenten dinner on March 19^{th} , a list of supplies needed was passed around. April 6^{th} , the parish will celebrate Dot Pierce's 90^{th} birth-day in the Parish Hall following the 10:00 A.M. service. Kimberly confirmed that the next meeting would be April 13^{th} – Palm Sunday – as there shouldn't be any conflicts.

Junior Warden:

Sexton is still working out.

Lawn care – Bruce has talked with the current lawn service, and they have agreed to continue maintaining the grounds. Bruce will be in contact with them to sign a new contract.

The one furnace in the church was repaired by Climatemakers for a final cost of \$758.98.

Old Business:

The safety walkthrough with Church Insurance was completed on 2/18/2025 without complaint.

New Business:

Vel announced that she had heard we were not supplying palm crosses to the children in the Day School. The Vestry was notified that the children will begin school break the Monday following Palm Sunday and the palms would not be delivered to the church until late Friday (the last day of school before break). Vel volunteered look into purchasing the palms elsewhere just for this purpose and they would make them up for distribution before the last day.

The next Vestry meeting will be on April 13, 2025.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer and then adjourned.

St. Peter's Church was organized in 1885 and the cornerstone was dedicated October 5th, 1886. This structure still stands on Brown Avenue in Norfolk, VA. The first worship service at our present site was in the parish hall on Christmas Eve, 1959. All existing construction was completed in 1965.
